

## Andrew's Story...



Sorting donated shoes and clothes was one of many ways Andrew "gave back" while staying at ROH.

*Can you imagine living in the woods in the middle of winter, sleeping in a tent on the cold, hard snow covered ground every night?*

If you want to know what that's like, ask Andrew. For three years, he slept outside in the woods in every kind of weather imaginable. And, that is only one chapter in what Andrew describes as a "very hard life."

As a child, Andrew was abused in numerous ways by his adoptive father. At age five, Andrew didn't want to eat his soup. His stepfather shoved a funnel in his mouth and poured boiling chicken noodle soup down his throat burning his vocal cords so severely that he had major problems speaking until he was over 30-years-old. Andrew recalls that he spent much of his time as a child locked up in a room and is thankful he didn't die from the abuse.

Andrew moved out of the house at 14 and lived on the streets until he was 18. He did, however, continue his education and graduated from high school after which he

The Campus Kitchens Project is a nationwide organization that works to redistribute excess food from university dining halls in order to serve in-need populations in local communities.

Walsh University is the 44th university and second in the state to officially join the national network of The Campus Kitchens Project. They have chosen Refuge of Hope as their local community partner to provide a minimum of 25 pounds of food per week for meals served in the Meal Ministry.

"It is a blessing they chose us and the experience is just the tip of the iceberg," Dawn Bowman, Director of Meal Ministry, commented. She noted that conversations are expanding in regards to working together to tackle the root issues of hunger. "It's not just feeding people, but it's getting in there and finding out how do we put an end to hunger...how do we break the cycle? We're united to utilize and redistribute leftover food to feed the hungry in our community," said Bowman.

## WHO KNEW \$2.00 COULD DO SO MUCH

A very perceptive 10-year old boy\* was attending his grandmother's funeral and overheard his family's discussion regarding the lack of resources to pay for all the burial expenses. Losing his grandmother was already hard enough, but now he felt there was not enough money to bury her.

The problem was weighing heavy on this young man because he loved his grandmother. So he approached the funeral director and handed him the \$2.00 bill pictured here. The boy said, "I would like to help my family pay you. Here is my money."

The funeral director was very touched and explained to the child that the family all went in together to pay the expenses for the funeral. The boy then looked up to the funeral director and said, "You must know a lot of people who would need this money. Can you give it to someone who really needs it?"

A meal at Refuge of Hope costs about \$1.85. Even though he did not know it this special 10-year old provided a meal for a man, woman or child in our Meal Ministry. Perhaps it was a meal for a grandmother, a child or a homeless person, but his heartfelt gift made a difference in the life of someone who was hungry and needed help!

## Andrew's Story...continued

joined the Army, fighting in Operation Desert Storm. After getting out of the military, Andrew spent several years playing in a band, Element Z, calling it "the most fun I've ever had in my life."

Andrew got married and had a daughter, Cheyenne, currently a senior and honor student in high school. Andrew and his daughter remain in touch. "She contacted me recently to say she loved me. I can't even begin to explain how proud I am of her," Andrew said.

Arrested for domestic abuse, his 13-year marriage ended in divorce. "I was on medication and decided I didn't need to take it any longer. Big mistake. I don't honestly remember exactly what happened but I ended up in jail," Andrew said. Once released, he decided to get away by living in the woods on property his grandfather had left him. He slept in a tent and hunted for his food; rabbits, squirrels or whatever he could catch. Eventually, through his daughter and Parole Officer, Andrew ended up at ROH.

Andrew attributes God and ROH to helping him change his outlook on life. As a person who didn't make friends easily and who always felt like an outsider, Andrew said it is becoming easier for him to build relationships while staying at ROH's shelter. "The guys here are great. They have shown me true friendship, stand with me when I have a problem and never judge me. This is the first time in my life I feel absolutely accepted by everyone," Andrew said.

Even though Andrew's life seems to be heading in a more positive direction today, he realizes the road forward won't always be smooth. Andrew faces numerous health issues including suffering from multiple personalities. He faces these problems with a sense of humor joking that "even by myself, I'm never alone." Recent tests show Andrew also suffering from stage one Parkinson's disease.

As this story was being written, Andrew moved from ROH's shelter into his own apartment. His focus is on a fresh start and becoming self-sufficient again. "I'm just now trying to look out for myself. It's hard to love someone else when you don't love yourself...but I'm learning. I want to be the man I know I can be but have always been afraid to be," Andrew said.

The odds look promising that this is one chapter of Andrew's life that will end on a positive note.
