Living on a limited Social Security income, Russell really appreciates how he is able to stretch his monthly budget by receiving meals at Refuge of Hope. He especially likes the give-a-way shelves where he looks for muffins and "goodies."

In the Refuge of Hope dining room, you will find families with children, homeless individuals and many seniors over 60 years old. Russell appreciates the meals of course, but he also comes here for the social interaction with the other guests, staff and volunteers. He always sat across the table from Annie, and they talked while sharing their meal together. Annie is now homebound due to illness and Refuge of Hope sends meals to her through a resident in her apartment building.

While the meals served at Refuge of Hope are vital to nourish the body, individuals have other needs that must also be filled according to Meal Ministry Manager Jo Ann Carpenter.

"We attempt to serve all those in our dining room with love, compassion and respect as these are crucial elements in meeting the emotional needs we all have," she said. "The Refuge of Hope family, made up of dinner guests, volunteers, donors and shelter residents, is a special group. We eat and pray together, sometimes have disagreements, but at every meal you can feel the love and care we have for each other."

Being treated with love and kindness plus "you will get your belly full..." what's not to like about that combination!

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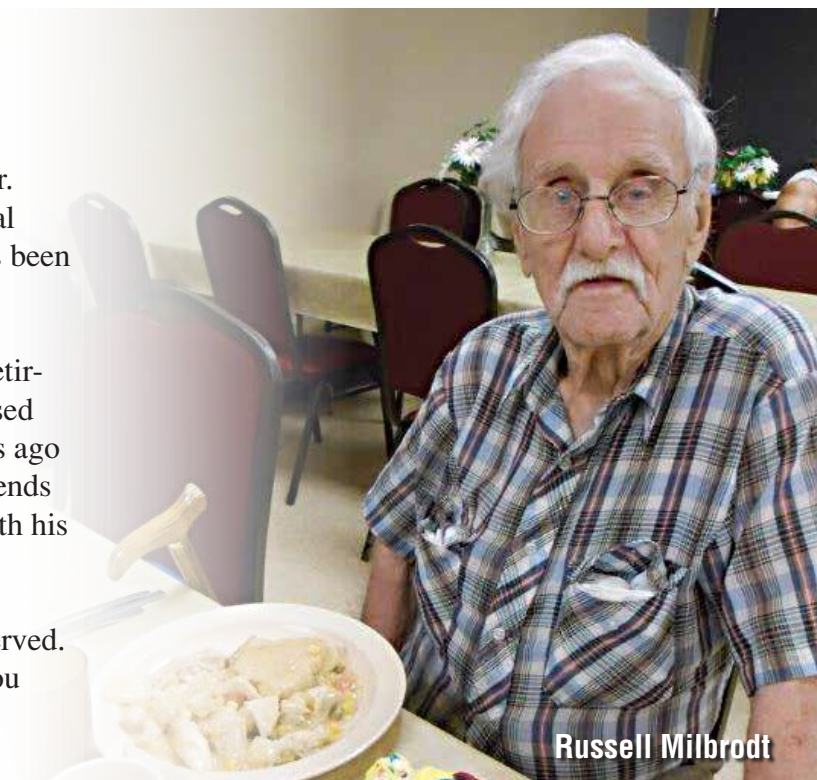
“...you get your belly full,” says Russell.

Almost every day, Refuge of Hope welcomes a special guest for dinner. Russell Milbrodt, a 94 year old veteran, drives ten miles to share a meal with our Refuge of Hope family. He is our oldest dinner guest and has been coming to our dining room for over four years.


Born and raised in Canton, Russell worked hard all of his life before retiring from Ohio Grating. Russell and his wife, Marlene, of 32 years raised five boys in the Stark County area. His wife passed away several years ago and one of his sons has also gone to be with the Lord. Russell now spends weekends with his biological family and weekdays enjoying dinner with his Refuge of Hope family.

“Sometimes the people who come here are in bad shape,” Russell observed. “But they get treated well at Refuge of Hope. The food is great and you get your belly full!”

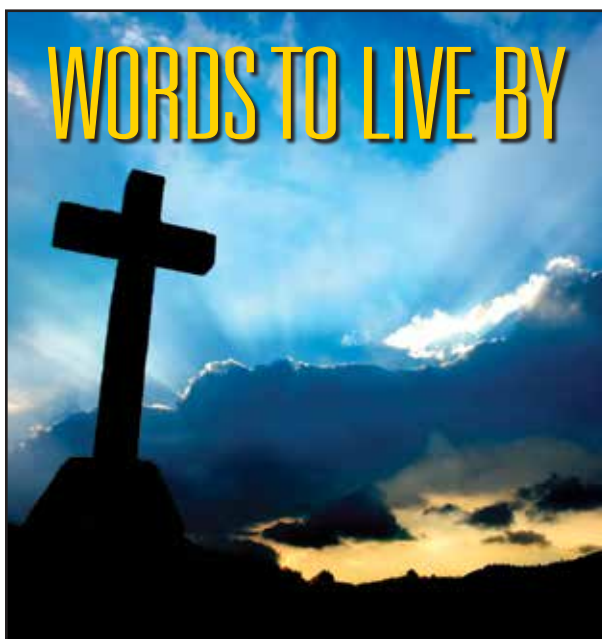

HUNGER REMAINS BIG ISSUE IN STARK COUNTY

Have you ever been hungry? Not just “missed lunch hungry” but haven’t had anything to eat for a day or more and no idea when you will get to eat again hungry.

According to the Stark County Hunger Task Force, many people in Stark County fit into that not sure from where my next meal is coming category. They are called “food insecure.” The United States Department of Agriculture defines food insecure as “consistent access to adequate food is limited by lack of money and other resources at times during the year.”

The Task Force reported that “the county’s overall food insecurity rate stands at 15.3%, and alarmingly, the county’s child food insecurity rate is 23.8%, leaving more than 57,000 Stark County neighbors in food insecure households.” The report also stated 25% of Stark County children live at or below the poverty level and 10% of our senior citizens are food insecure. It should also be noted that about 30% of Canton residents live at or below the poverty level.

The Task Force report is not news at Refuge of Hope. We have seen the number of meals served annually in our Meal Ministry rise from 14,500 in 2008 to nearly 69,000 in 2012. At our current pace, we will eclipse the 70,000 meals served mark this year.

Mother Teresa said “When a poor person dies of hunger, it did not happen because God did not care for him or her. It has happened because neither you nor I wanted to give that person what he or she needed.” Hunger is a complex issue but, as Mother Teresa recognized, the solution is actually simple. It’s you and me.
